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FACT SHEET

- Trinity Place Foundation of Alberta was established in 1974 to provide affordable accommodation to seniors living in downtown Calgary and provide a unique, supportive environment for tenants, ultimately promoting their well-being.
- The first project was a 180-suite apartment facility, built on land made available to Trinity from the Anglican Diocese and the Church of the Redeemer and the Calgary Roman Catholic Diocese.
- Trinity was recognized as a "management body" in 1985 when it was asked to assume the management of two provincially owned buildings (King Tower and Murdoch Manor) from the City of Calgary.
- In 1990, Edwards Place was added to the portfolio for a total of 833 suites.
- In 2005, Peter Coyle Place joined the portfolio of suites available.
- 903 suites are currently located in five apartment buildings:
 - **Carter Place** was the first building for Trinity, established in 1977, dually serving as the head office. With 179 units, a greenhouse, arboretum, recreation room, laundromat and computer room. Conveniently located in the downtown core, steps away from the LRT for easy access to shopping and services.
 - **Murdoch Manor** is the largest facility with 369 rooms. Panoramic city views, a solarium, a hair salon, picnic area, recreation rooms, laundromat, computer room. Located beside the river with easy access to pathways and parks.
 - The **George C. King Tower** has 143 rooms and houses the Alexandra Community Health Care Centre. Services in building to connect with benefits and supports. Garden and picnic area. Laundromat. Located close to Fort Calgary, the river and Inglewood.
 - **Edwards Place** has 147 rooms and houses the Community Resources Coordinator. There is also a computer room and laundromat available to residents. Located in the downtown core, two blocks from the LRT and access to all the amenities offered in the downtown.
 - **Peter Coyle Place** is the latest addition to Trinity's portfolio, opening in July 2005. It has 70 rooms, is designed for assisted living full meal service (3 daily) in the dining area, laundry service, individual rooms, some with shared washrooms, dormitory style rooms, and a 24/7 emergency response system. Provides housing to men and women 60 years of age and older who are unable to access traditional seniors housing.

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
